Homeschool Options

What is homeschooling?

Homeschooling is the practice of opting to teach one's own children at home via parents, tutors, or virtual programs instead (or in lieu) of sending them to school.

Do I have to register somewhere?

Children of US military and DOD civilian personnel overseas are not subject to US state mandatory attendance statutes while in another country. Children of US military and DOD civilian personnel overseas are not subject to the school laws in Italy. DoDEA does not require families register with them, but registering as a homeschooler with DoDEA is an option.

Can I receive any financial assistance?

No financial support is available through the Non-DoD Schools Program (NDSP) to attend schools other than the DoDEA schools on the Support Site.

How much does homeschooling cost?

\$100 to \$500+ per month per student.

Cheapest approach (\$100-300): Consider finding services for free or exchange your services with someone else.

Moderate approach (\$300-500): Includes a few paid extras like co-ops, tutors, online courses, or extracurricular classes like art or music.

Most expensive approach (\$500+): Includes paying for tutors, online classes, video courses, correspondence schools, or all-inclusive curriculum packages.

Budget-friendly ways to source your curriculum: Borrow or rent, library check-out, sales, reusable or multi-level options, apply for grants, online used book sources and free websites.

Types of Curriculum

Look for complete curriculum packages (a.k.a. "boxed curriculum"), online courses, subjectbased curriculum and integrated studies/unit studies.

Also compare whether or not curriculum is:

Student-paced or program-paced

Comprehensive or supplemental

Independent learning or teacher-led

Online or textbook/workbook

Automated grading or manual grading

When you find a homeschool curriculum provider that you think may work, find out if you can access the material on a trial basis.

Educational Approach

There are many approaches to homeschooling: Classical, Charlotte Mason, Deschooling, Eclectic Montessori, Flexi-schooling, Roadschooling, School-at-Home, Unit Studies, Unschooling, Waldorf Education, and Worldschooling methods. Make sure to research the pros and cons of each.

Learning Styles

Generally seven styles which include: visual (spatial), aural (auditory-musical), verbal (linguistic), physical (kinesthetic), logical (mathematical), social (interpersonal) and solitary (intrapersonal). Make sure to research the details of each to know how to best support your student.

Through online searches, there are several websites that offer quizzes to help assess your student's style.

What are learning groups?

Learning groups consist of: informal co-ops, formal co-ops or resource centers; hybrid, cottage or university-model schools; and online courses, which can be either live or self-paced classes.

Some high school students may also opt for dual-enrollment courses (college level).

What is an "Umbrella School"?

An umbrella school is an alternative education school that serves to oversee the homeschooling of children to fulfill government educational requirements.

Umbrella schools vary greatly in what they offer and cost. Some offer group classes, a defined curriculum, sports, field trips, standardized testing, and more. Others exist only to meet the minimum legal requirements, allowing parents choose their curriculum and methods of teaching, as well as freedom from an annual evaluation or testing requirements. Additionally, some umbrella schools follow a specific faith, while others are secular.

What does "Accreditation" mean?

It means that the homeschool has been inspected by an outside, independent agency who has determined it to meet accepted standards for schools. These standards include the seriousness of the course of studies, the managing of academic records, accounting practices, and business practices.

How is it determined that a student is eligible to receive special education?

special education funds, and provide a range of professional development relating to
special education?
Will I need to find my own local Special Education Professional?

Registering as a homeschooler with DoDEA

Am I eligible to homeschool and use DoDEA services?

DoD dependent students who are educated in a home-school setting but are eligible to enroll in DoDEA-Europe and live within the commuting distance of the DoDEA school are entitled to use or receive the specified auxiliary services without being required either to enroll in or register for a minimum number of courses offered by the school.

What are auxiliary services?

Auxiliary services include access to academic resources, access to the school information center (i.e., library), after-hours use of school facilities, and participation in music, sports, and other extra-curricular activities and interscholastic activities. These services may be subject to appropriate supervision and availability. Auxiliary services do not include participation in DoDEA commencement ceremonies. Academic resources do not include consumables, calculators, pens, paper, or other supplies normally provided by a parent. Items, such as textbooks and workbooks, may be limited to use within the school based on resource availability.

What special education services can I access with DoDEA?

Eligible DoD dependent home-school students may access DoDEA special education services and related services (e.g., occupational therapy, physical therapy, speech therapy, clinical psychology, etc.) if he or she meets the eligibility criteria for receipt of special education and related services. Each DoDEA school has a copy of the eligibility criteria for special education and related services. Special education and related services (including transportation arrangements) will be provided in accordance with applicable regulations (i.e., DoDEA Regulation 1342.13 and DoDI/DoDM 1342.12). Special education services may include initial testing and development of an Individual Education Plan (IEP) (if the student is found eligible for services). Eligible DoD dependent home-school students who need initial testing and/or development of an IEP, but are not enrolled in a DoDEA school or course, should be registered under the Child Find code. Sponsors of home-school dependents eligible to receive special education services at a DoDEA school must complete a registration form and comply with other registry procedures and requirements of the school.

How do I register with DoDEA?

Please note that registering with DoDEA is not the same as enrolling. You may create an account and register with Naples Elementary School or Naples Middle High School at <u>https://www.dodea.edu/registration</u>. After completing the online portion, reach out to the school site register to inform on status and to work towards selecting classes and services.
